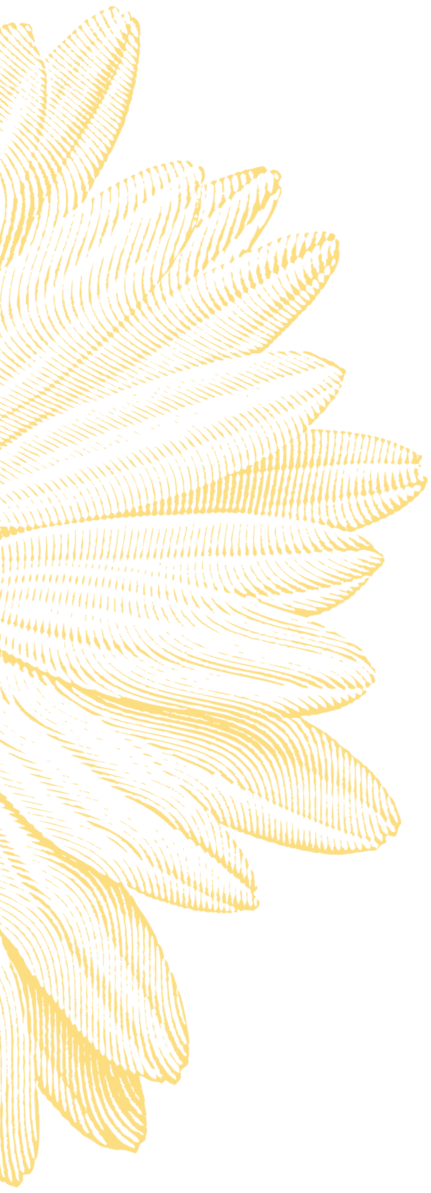

The Investors Group Charitable Giving Program

Since 2006, the Investors Group Charitable Giving Program has offered Canadians a convenient way to manage their ongoing charitable giving. By incorporating charitable giving into their overall financial plan, clients can give their money in a thoughtful and strategic way and leave a lasting legacy.

How it works

A Charitable Giving Program account allows the donor to do the following:

- Set up a charitable giving account, to which they give a unique name;
- Make irrevocable donations to the foundation of either cash, securities, or life insurance;
- Receive a tax receipt for each donation;
- Recommend grants annually to eligible charities for their lifetime and beyond; and
- Increase the amount that they grant over time as the assets in the account grow, tax-free.

The program can also simplify a client's charitable giving activities by consolidating their giving activities into one account.

Since the Charitable Giving Program began granting funds in 2007, over \$4 million has been donated to registered Canadian charities, and more than 520 charities have benefited from the grants that the Program distributes.

Ease and flexibility are hallmarks of the Program

The Charitable Giving Program is a very appealing approach for clients, and it benefits both the giver and the recipient.

Toronto East Senior Consultant Ron Darroch introduces the program to clients who traditionally support one or more charities every year. "It's as easy as setting up a regular account," he said.

Some of the clients he serves are looking to leave money or assets to a charity in their will, and they have not realized that they can distribute these assets during their lifetime.

One client used the tax receipt from her donation over a period of five years against her taxable income. "She also liked that each year she could change the charities that received her support. It was her legacy to define," he said.

Making the program accessible

Enhancements to the Program in 2011 have made it easier for clients to grow their account and support their causes.

“Clients can now give between four per cent and eight per cent of their capital in any given year,” said Richard Irish, Vice-President, Community Affairs and Area Marketing. “This means they can support a charity more strongly in a given year.”

Clients can also add to their account in \$1,000 amounts. “This makes it fairly easy for clients to continue to grow their fund, or for others to contribute to a fund as a gift,” he said.

Supporting hundreds of Canadian charities

Since the Charitable Giving Program began granting funds in 2007, over \$4 million has been donated to registered Canadian charities, and more than 520 charities have benefited from the grants that the Program distributes. In 2011, nearly \$1.59 million in grants were distributed.

Creating a legacy of giving

During our lifetime, we often measure our success by tangible accomplishments. We own homes, vacation properties, stocks, bonds, mutual funds, and other valuable assets. Sometimes, we measure our success by our achievements in the workplace. While these are important, they are only a small part of the impact we want to have on our communities.

The Investors Group Charitable Giving Program allows donors to shape and define their legacy. Whatever their interest, whatever their passion, they can make a difference.

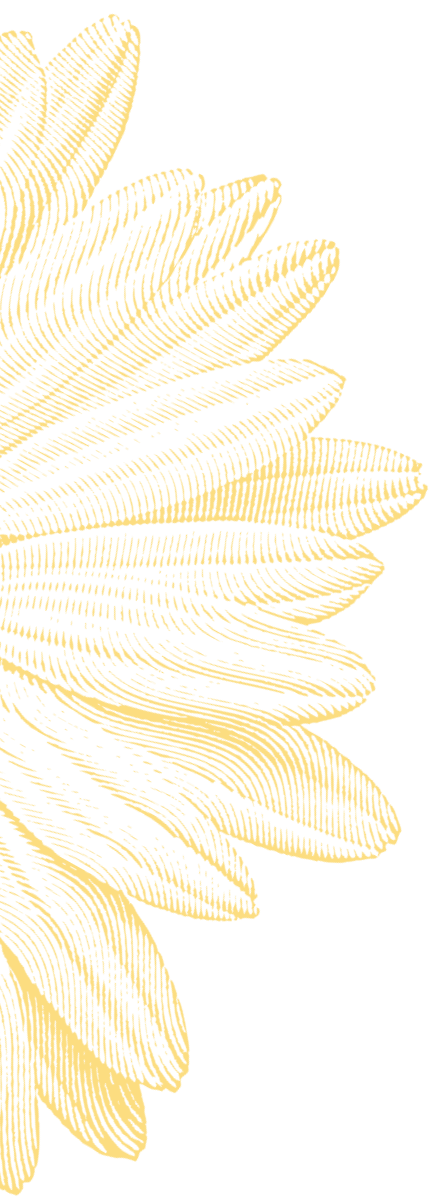

Working to improve young Canadians' financial literacy

Investors Group has long recognized the need for – and value of – financial literacy. Corporately, Investors Group has had a long-standing partnership with the Canadian Foundation for Economic Education (CFEE) – a national, non-profit organization that works to promote enhanced financial literacy for Canadians. The partnership has led to the development of two powerful programs aimed at improving Canadians' financial understanding: Building Futures and Money and Youth.

The Building Futures Project is a collaborative effort co-sponsored by the Manitoba government, Investors Group and CFEE to integrate basic economic and financial literacy into the province's core school curricula. It integrates 50 learning modules throughout grades 4 to 12 into existing courses in Mathematics, Social Studies, Language Arts, and Science.

"Sharing knowledge about financial literacy is an essential part of who we are," said Murray Taylor, President and Chief Executive Officer. "We know that when financial literacy is achieved at a young age, children are better equipped to undertake their economic and financial roles, responsibilities

and decisions with confidence and competence and that's why we feel this project is so important."

Resources for grades 4 to 8 are in a pilot state and are expected to be available to teachers by the fall of 2012. Following Manitoba's lead, Saskatchewan has also made a commitment to the Building Futures program and discussions are also taking place with Alberta, British Columbia and Nova Scotia.

"The support provided by Investors Group has made the Building Futures Project possible in Canada," said Gary Rabbior, President, CFEE. "In the end, this project will likely have done more to integrate financial literacy into Canadian



schools than any other single initiative – and we have Investors Group to thank for helping us to accomplish that goal."

Building Futures follows on the heels of the successful Money and Youth program, which was launched in the mid-1990s and has provided over 300,000 workbooks and teacher's guides across Canada free of charge, along with a website and other resources for educators and parents.

Improving the financial literacy of Canadians is vital and necessary – and Investors Group is helping to get it done through an ongoing commitment to financial education.

Long-standing partnership renewed to benefit coaches and athletes

Investors Group's 20-year relationship with the Coaching Association of Canada (CAC) is our longest-running national community partnership. Building on our many past successes, Investors Group was proud to renew this relationship in 2011 for a further three-year term and continue supporting the National Volunteer Sport Administrator Award and Community Coaching Conferences, along with a new technology initiative.

The Investors Group National Volunteer Sport Administrator Award recognizes contributions to community sport programs made by dedicated volunteers. These volunteers give of their time so that coaches and athletes can enjoy the benefits of well-organized sport.

"We are very pleased to recognize the outstanding volunteers who run amateur sport programs in our communities and honour them for their dedication," said Richard Irish, Vice-President, Community Affairs and Area Marketing. "Investors

Group is also proud of its long-standing relationship with the Coaching Association of Canada in developing coaching skills at the grassroots level through Investors Group Community Coaching Conferences across Canada."

The Investors Group Community Coaching Conferences program supports organizations that bring coaches of community-based sports together under one roof to learn, train and network with each other. Renewed support for the CAC includes a new online resource HUB for community coaches. The online resource will include a spot for community coaches to access downloadable resources to support their first time on the field. This interactive system helps coaches to become properly trained and aligned with

the CAC's objectives. It also assists with entry into the CAC's National Coaching Certification Program through which the CAC can offer continued education.

"Investors Group has been a tremendous partner to the Coaching Association of Canada through their continued support and recognition for the over two million community coaches in Canada," said Nancy J. Spotton, Vice President, Sales and Marketing, Coaching Association of Canada. "Investors Group has also invested in our new technology initiative. This new initiative, combined with the community conferences, and the recognition of our tireless sport administrators, would not have been possible without the incredible support from Investors Group."

To better communicate about the NVW campaign, Volunteer Canada fully integrated social media into its campaign for 2011. From Facebook to Twitter to YouTube, their goal was to use social media in innovative ways to better engage voluntary organizations and to encourage best practices in volunteer recognition. To help achieve this goal, they developed a new NVW electronic thank you card.

"This was a fresh idea for recognizing volunteers in 2011. The superhero-themed e-card allowed voluntary organizations to create personalized greetings for their volunteers and to say

thanks for the many contributions they make year round," said Ruth. "The e-card was widely distributed, as thousands of Canadians visited the e-card website and created their own personalized messages of thanks."

Investors Group will continue to actively support Volunteer Canada in the development of new skill-building tools and resources that assist voluntary organizations in their efforts to thank Canadian volunteers each and every year.

When Debbie Mealia moved to British Columbia's Sunshine Coast, she saw a need for transitional housing for women and did not hesitate to take action. Thirty-two years later, there are still needs in the community and the Greater Vancouver North Consultant responds to them with the same positive attitude she showed all those years ago.

For the profound impact on her community through her long-term commitment to volunteering and her record of outstanding customer service at Investors Group, Debbie was named the 2011 recipient of the Herbert H. Carnegie Community Service Award.

"I am honoured to receive this award and am proud to work for a company that supports employees who are giving back to their communities," said Debbie.

After moving to Sechelt, Debbie took a job assessing the educational needs of women and quickly realized that abused women and children needed a safe place to stay. She initiated a project with Sunshine Coast Community Services that saw the creation of Yew Transition House which 30 years later, is still helping women create independent lives.

"She has this tremendous giving energy," said Vicki Dobbyn, Executive Director, Sunshine Coast Community Services. "I think it was really Debbie's ability to listen to what had been previously unheard voices that made [this project] happen."

Debbie also helped create Grandma's Garden at Sunshine Coast Community Services in memory of her mother-in-law.

"The property that our agency is headquartered at had a really dismal backyard," said Vicki. "[Debbie] and her family members began a project to reclaim it and created a beautiful oasis in the center of Sechelt. It's another example of how Debbie can be really inspiring around getting people together with a vision."

The most visible and dynamic evidence of Debbie's devotion to her community has to be the creation of the

Midtown apartments with the Sunshine Coast Association for Community Living.

Debbie worked with the Association as a client and noticed that although the organization was receiving less government funding each year, there were still many people in the community who needed the Association's services. Again, Debbie took action.

Debbie and the Association built the Midtown apartments to promote independent living in an inclusive community setting for people with developmental disabilities.

How Debbie helped complete this multi-million dollar project in three years is nothing less than innovative – given that all she had was a \$5,000 investment from the Association. Debbie found a property developer to be a partner in the project,

engaged generous community members including clients, and raised funds.

“The most radical thing Debbie has done for our organization is to inspire us all to think big – to not feel dependent or that we require handouts,” said Glen McClughan, Executive Director, Sunshine Coast Association for Community Living.

The Association was so inspired by the project’s success that it bought a commercial property as a legacy investment and is now looking at creating an organic farm to provide meaningful work as well as affordable housing for its clients.

Debbie has given much to her community through her volunteer work, and believes that she has received much in return.

“I want to be part of a community that has room for everyone in it to thrive,” said Debbie. “A measure of a community is how well the least fortunate person is doing.”

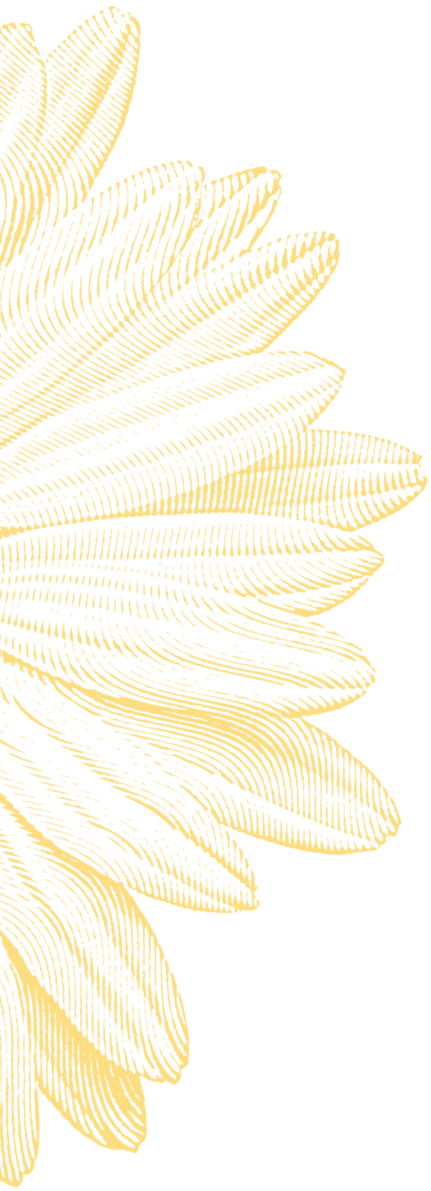

Helping Nova Scotia's children start the school year off right

Thanks to the hard work and dedication of Halifax region office Assistant Linda Elliott, Halifax Community and Family Services handed out nearly 100 backpacks full of school supplies to children from Halifax, Dartmouth and Spryfield last fall.

"Linda launched this back-to-school program herself six years ago and then partnered with The Salvation Army three years ago," explained Halifax Regional Director Anjali Jensen.

Children receive everything necessary to start the school year, including pencils, pens, glue, loose leaf scribbles, binders, a lunch bag and more. Ultimately, the amount of funds raised determines how many backpacks are available.

"We have a lot of repeat donors now," Linda said proudly, adding that her co-workers in Halifax have helped from the beginning. "I have a lot of colleagues that I ask every year and family, friends and other local businesses are all on-board as well."

Families with children in primary school to grade six applied in advance to receive a backpack. Major Brenda Bungay,

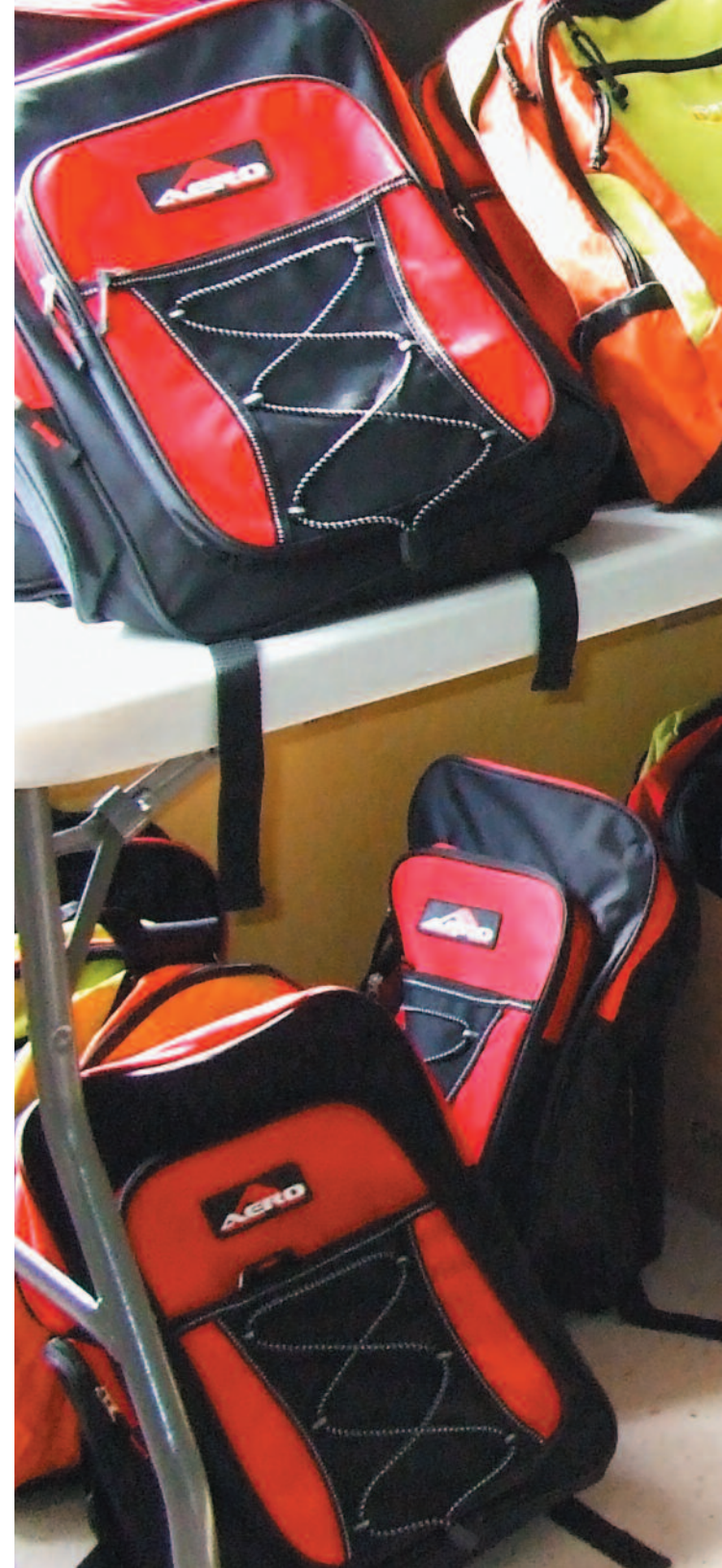
Director of Halifax Community and Family Services (CFS), says that while there is always a need for school supplies, this program helps equip many children with the tools they need to start the school year right.

"If it wasn't for Linda and what she does to help raise funds, this program would have to come out of the CFS budget and we don't have the funds for that," added Major Bungay. "It's a bonus to have somebody from outside doing the fundraising."

The event has grown from 12 backpacks in its first year to 100 this year and Linda has no intention of stopping now.

"I see it getting even bigger," she said. "We'd love to take it to 150, 180, 200 kids so that we can help even more families send their children to school on a level playing field."

Challenge participants willingly choose to have their heads shaved to raise funds for Leucan. Participants seek donations from family and friends which are then given to Leucan at the fundraising event.

Leucan is an association dedicated to helping cancer-stricken children and families. Through events like the Shaved Head Challenge, Leucan funds clinical cancer research and offers children and family members living with cancer much needed financial and emotional support in hospital, home or school settings.

“It was lot of fun but also very emotional because we were doing this for Stéphane,” said François of the event. “A bald

head is a small sacrifice to make to help in the fight against cancer. The time it takes for hair to grow back doesn’t compare to the time it takes to get your health back once you’ve been diagnosed with cancer.”

François’ two sons, one of whom is an Investors Group Consultant, also participated in the challenge. For his other son, participation required an extra dose of courage.

“My youngest son was 20 years old at the time and had long hair,” said François. “He was a really good sport to join our office in the challenge.”

In total, the Boisbriand region office raised an impressive \$10,000 for Leucan which will benefit the over 3,300 families accessing the association’s services. The event was such a success that François was asked to take on the role of President of the Shaved Head Challenge for the North Shore Region in 2012 – a role he was honoured to accept.

Keeping the wheels turning for children with disabilities

In 2001, Winnipeg South Consultants Cal Higgins and Les Wiens decided to combine their passion for cycling with their strong belief in giving back to the community.

Eleven years later, their passion still propels them. In what has become known as "The Road to Rehab," Cal and Les embark on a two-day bike trip each August to raise funds for the Children's Rehabilitation Foundation in Winnipeg. They are joined by other committed cyclists, including co-workers, friends, and clients, all riding to support children living with disabilities and special needs.

Since that first trip in 2001 – which was farther than planned after Les calculated the distance in kilometres from a map measured in miles – the pair have pedaled the back roads of Manitoba to raise more than \$140,000 for the Foundation, and have helped more than 35 children.

They had intended to start small back in 2001, but it didn't work out that way when they asked the Foundation for a fundraising target for that first ride.

"We expected they would ask us to raise \$1,000 or so, but instead they came up with a cause that needed \$13,000 – and what we thought was an insurmountable goal," said Les. "Since then the goals have been smaller, but we typically raise two or three times the target amount we've set."

The money raised goes toward the purchase of specialized equipment such as lightweight wheelchairs, voice simulators, specialized bikes, and other supports to help children realize their abilities.

In October 2011 their unwavering support for the cause was recognized at the Foundation's A Night of Miracles Gala. Les and Cal were the recipients of the Miracle Award, presented to them for going "above and beyond" the call, and for making raising funds for the Foundation a priority in their daily life.

"This is definitely a labour of love, and the time and energy we invest annually is greatly magnified by the joy we receive when a child we've helped out is able to utilize the specialized apparatus that we concentrated on obtaining for them...it's just a sight to behold," said Cal.

Les (now Division Director of Winnipeg East) agrees. "We're getting older and the cycling is getting harder. But when you meet the children and their families, the aches and pains of cycling are put in perspective. They disappear totally. These kids make every ounce of our efforts worthwhile!"





Making strides to understand dementia

For seven years running, Investors Group has been the title sponsor for the yearly Alzheimer Society Memory Walks in the province of Alberta.

The Red Deer region office has been a big supporter of the Central Alberta walk for all of those seven years, and the 2011 event was a tremendous success despite a torrential downpour. Indeed, soggy weather has become part of the tradition, but it doesn't dampen anyone's spirit. More than 100 walkers went the distance – five kilometres – raising over \$25,000 for Alzheimer's education and support in Alberta and the Northwest Territories. Province-wide, the 2011 walks raised more than \$409,000.

In Red Deer, the Investors Group team included 20 walkers and volunteers, many of whom have a direct connection with the disease or with other forms of dementia. Perennial team captain Sharon Moffat has had five family members with Alzheimer's. "It's certainly a disease that people are becoming the most afraid of," she said. "It affects everyone somehow."

The event is held in June each year at the Sunnybrook Farm Museum and Interpretive Centre in the heart of Red Deer. Following the scenic walk through Kin Canyon, Investors Group volunteers cook up a delicious barbeque for all attendees, and there's rousing entertainment in the barn.

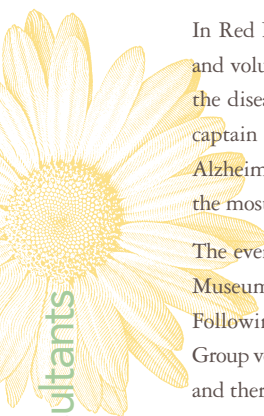
Regional Director Terry Nieth said that the local chapter of the Alzheimer Society has a very small staff, so they appreciate the coordinating role that Investors Group plays each year.

Going door to door to stamp out hunger

In British Columbia, more than 100,000 people turn to local food banks every year to help meet their basic sustenance needs. Food banks can struggle to keep their shelves stocked, and in the fall of 2011, donations were down at the Abbotsford Food Bank. It was the perfect time for the Fraser Valley office to step up and take part in the B.C. Thanksgiving Food Drive – a province-wide event that brings 40 communities together to put food on people’s tables using a simple and effective concept.

During “collection week,” volunteers deliver donation bags to residential addresses along assigned routes. On “collection day” the volunteers travel back through the neighbourhoods to collect the food. The office staffed an impressive 50 routes in Abbotsford, Yarrow, Chilliwack and Mission.

“It was a whirlwind of a day,” said Fraser Valley Regional Director Jamie Vermeeren. “I was thrilled that so many Consultants went out on a Saturday to support their communities. We were able to staff the routes so well that both the Abbotsford and Chilliwack food banks had no more room on their shelves.”

Food donations across the province totalled almost 250,000 pounds. Abbotsford alone collected nearly 10,000 pounds.

“Not only were the food banks extremely grateful, but I think everyone left feeling satisfied that they’d done good in their community that day,” Jamie said.

Earlier in the year, Division Director Bill Murray moved into a new home with his family and had conducted his own successful food drive to introduce himself to his neighbours. His three young boys had helped and also participated in the Thanksgiving event.

“No one, regardless of their situation, should ever be hungry,” Bill said. “I told the boys there are a lot of kids who don’t have enough food to eat. They understood that and were excited to help.”

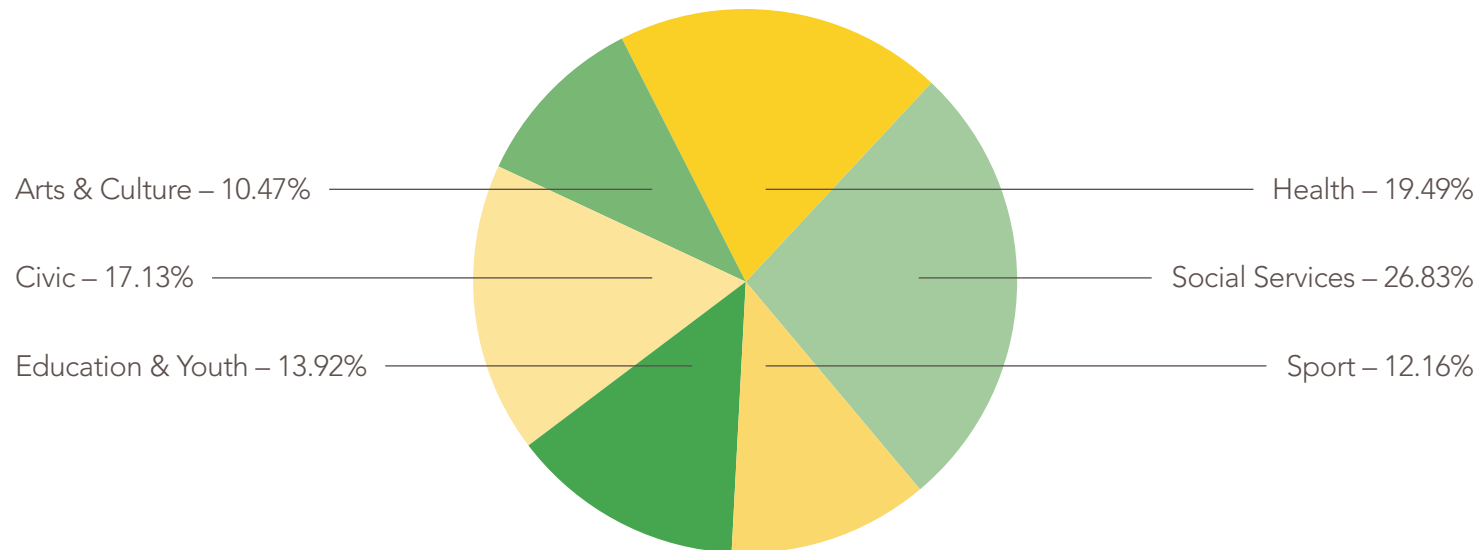
Percentage by area
