Formalizing our commitments

Investors Group demonstrates its commitment to corporate responsibility in its daily operations and through a number of formal commitments. Here are some highlights from 2015.

Volunteer Canada

For 19 years, Investors Group has partnered with Volunteer Canada and is a founding member of the Corporate Council on Volunteering, a corporate initiative to encourage employer-supported volunteering across Canada.

Bullfrog Power

In 2015 Investors Group made a significant commitment to renewable energy through its choice of 100% green natural gas for its head office building in Winnipeg. Through an agreement with Bullfrog Power, a Canadian green energy retailer, we buy renewable natural gas to match the building's conventional gas use, reducing our carbon dioxide emissions footprint by about 977 tonnes annually.

CDP

The Carbon Disclosure Project works to transform the way the world does business, to prevent climate change and protect our natural resources. We report to the CDP each year on our energy use and greenhouse gas emission performance.

Imagine Canada

Investors Group is a founding member of Imagine Canada and is committed to donating at least one per cent of our average annual pre-tax income to charitable and other non-profit organizations. In 2015, this amounted to more than \$6.8 million donated to over 1,600 organizations.

Signatory to the Principles for Responsible Investment

Investors Group is a signatory to The United Nations-supported Principles for Responsible Investment (PRI), a collaborative effort of global investors representing US \$59 trillion in assets under management with the goal of developing a more sustainable global financial system. The PRI includes a commitment to formally incorporate and report on environmental, social and governance (ESG) issues in our investment processes. ■

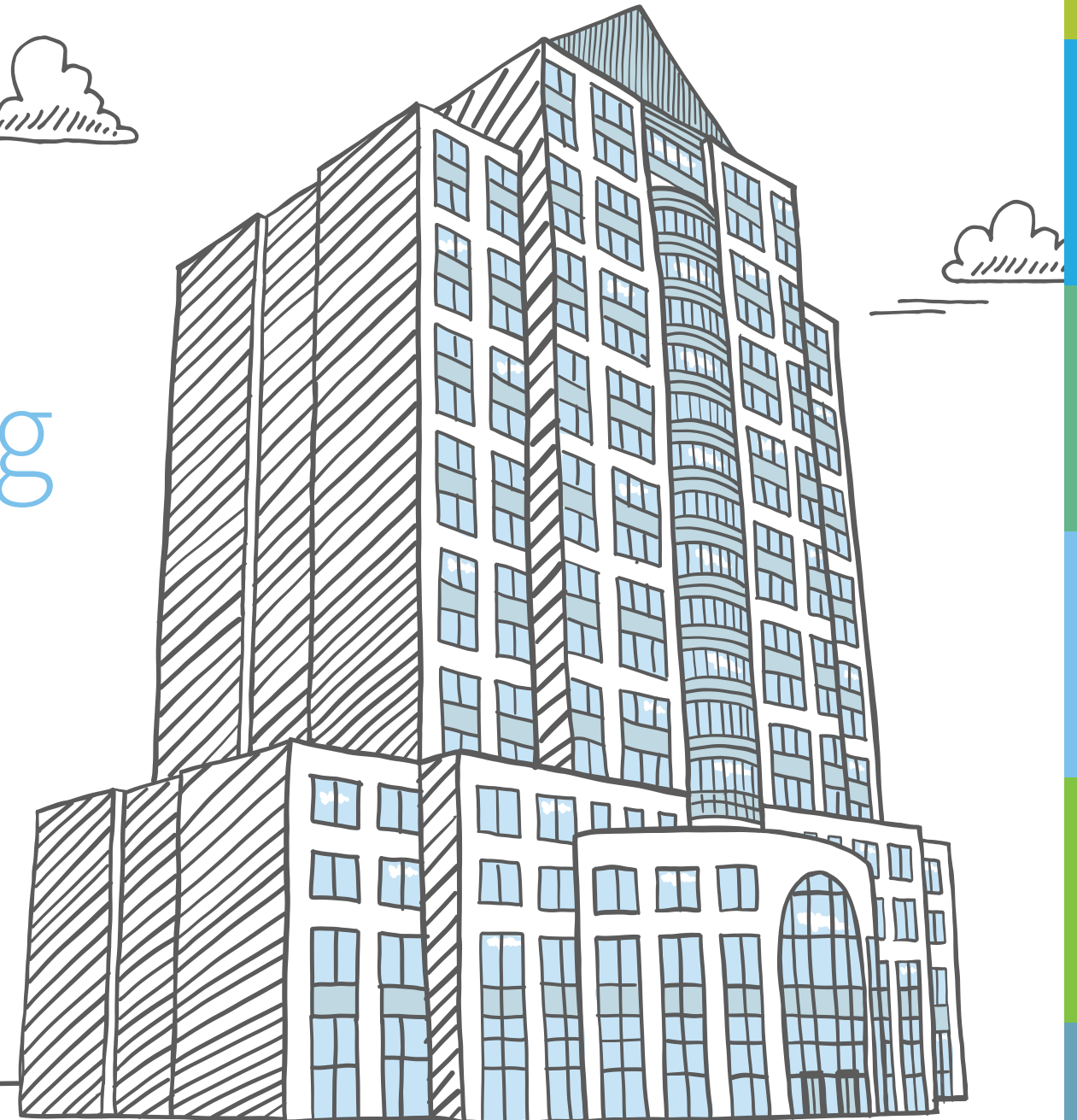

Grandparents nurture their young philanthropists

Retired educators Maury and Linda Williams have always been community minded. The long-time Investors Group clients give generously of their time and resources in the beautiful Okanagan city of Kelowna, where they raised two boys and now enjoy time with their four grandchildren.

Over the years, during meetings with Investors Group Consultant Anna-Marie Rasmussen (herself a mother of two boys), the topic of conversation often turned to the importance of family and community.

From these talks came an inspired plan for family giving that demonstrates how a little creativity and the Investors Group Charitable Giving Program can create a lasting legacy.

The Charitable Giving Program allows donors to set up and name a charitable giving account, to which they make donations of cash, securities, or life insurance. Then, annually, they recommend grants to eligible charities for their lifetime and beyond. They receive a tax receipt for each donation, and the assets in their account grow tax-free.

Maury and Linda decided to set up an account and have their grandchildren – ages 8, 9, 10, and 11 – make the decision about which charity or charities would receive the grant money each year.

“We wanted to instill in them the importance of sharing with others, and to help them see that through giving they can make a difference in their world,” said Maury. “And we hoped to give them a sense of empowerment rather than a sense of entitlement,” added Linda. “Also, it gives us a way to pass on our values to our descendants.”

The two sent invitations to the grandkids – featuring a graphic of their family tree – to attend a special event at the Investors Group Okanagan region office. Anna-Marie, her team, and Regional Director Karen Erickson added special touches to make the event a memorable one. They decorated a meeting room with balloons, brought snacks, and prepared a presentation to help the young ones understand the meaning of the word “philanthropist” and the significance of what their grandparents were inviting them to do.

The group watched videos from several charitable organizations to give them a sense of what kinds of groups they could support and how the money could be of benefit. Maury and Linda, in setting up the account, had specified the **SPCA** as the first-year beneficiary, knowing the kids would love to support it.

The transfer of responsibility for the account was marked by an official signing ceremony, in which each grandchild signed a document that indicated their grandparents were turning the decision-making over to them.



“We had three generations in the room, and the gathering was magical,” said Anna-Marie. “The kids were so excited, and they felt really important.”

The plan is to have the family talk about their charitable giving account each Thanksgiving when they gather to share a meal. They will express what is important to them, and listen to the grandkids as they determine which charity or charities will receive a grant in the coming year.

“As the years pass, and they become passionate about their own interests, we hope they will become really heartfelt philanthropists,” said Linda. ■

The program also provides you with a legacy of giving by allowing you to involve your family in philanthropic decision-making, both now and in the

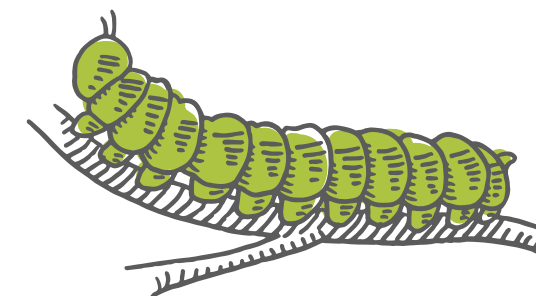
future. Involving heirs in the account and setting them up as successors in your will allows you to pass on your most essential values – the importance of giving back to your community and helping those less fortunate.

Helping coaches to help athletes

For 25 years Investors Group has proudly partnered with the [Coaching Association of Canada](#) (CAC), a world leader in coach training and certification. The CAC aims to improve the athlete experience through a focus on coach education.

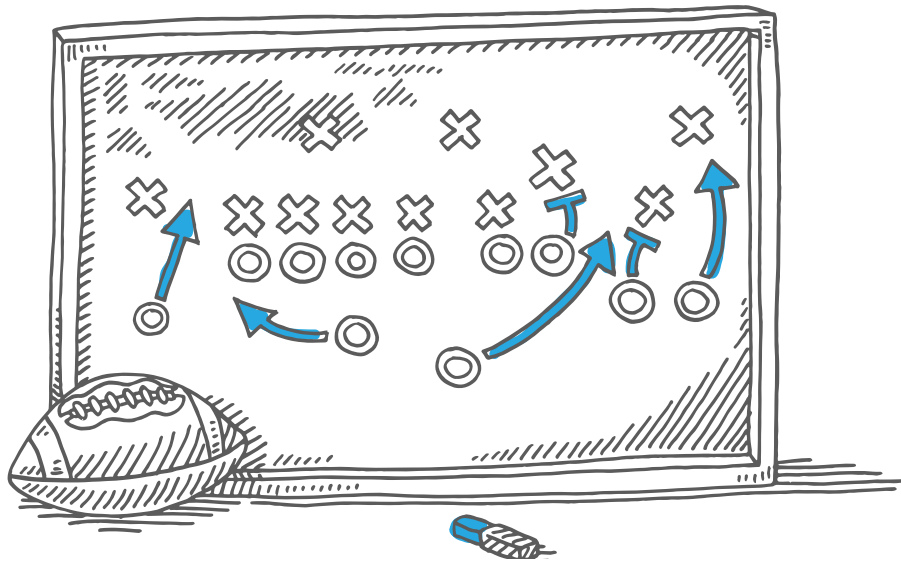
The CAC's National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP), launched in 1974, is currently the largest adult continuing education program in Canada. More than 6,000 people participate in an NCCP workshop each year.

Investors Group directly supports the national program, and in 2015 our funding allowed more than 1,560 coaches to attend an NCCP workshop and 3,000 participants to pursue coach development opportunities – a nearly 50% increase in NCCP workshop participation over 2014.

Investors Group also supports the CAC in a variety of other ways, including through the Get Coaching! program, launched in 2013. Get Coaching! is a free online tutorial series featuring tips, tools and downloadable resources that coaches can use to improve their skills and make team sport practices

more effective for young athletes. In 2015, there were more than 34,000 visits to the Get Coaching! web page.

“The Coaching Association of Canada is proud of its 25-year partnership with Investors Group and their continued commitment to supporting Canadian community coaches,” said Lorraine Lafrenière, Chief Executive Officer of the CAC. “Through various programs they support, we have been able to support thousands of coaches with education and resources which enhance athlete experiences and encourage Canadians to live healthy, active lifestyles.” ■

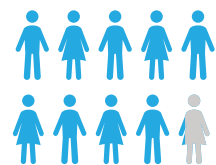
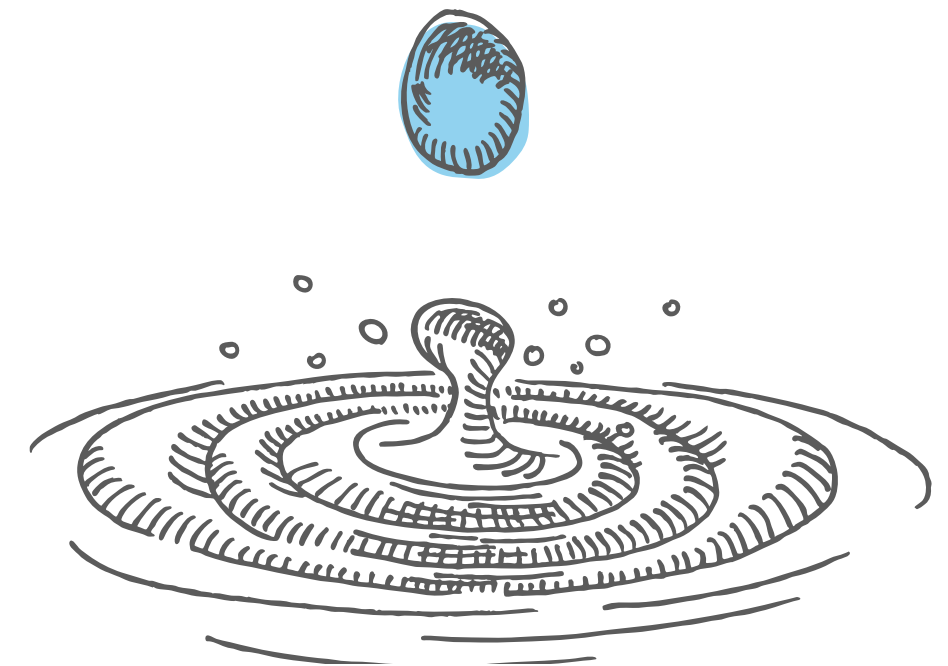

Helping youth be savvy about finances

In these changing and sometimes challenging financial times, it is more important than ever that young Canadians are equipped to make the many financial life decisions ahead of them.

Investors Group's ongoing collaboration with the [Canadian Foundation for Economic Education](#) (CFEE) continued to make a real contribution in 2015 to improving financial literacy – of our youth and their parents.

The company continued to support CFEE's Building Futures program, which helps provinces integrate financial education into the core curriculum for grades 4 to 10.

Building on the past success of the program in [Manitoba](#), in 2015 CFEE worked with the province's French language curriculum department to complete a French language adaptation of the program.

Work is now underway to promote the Building Futures program to teachers and schools in Ontario and is also in progress for the province of Québec and the four Atlantic provinces.

The work on Building Futures and the collaboration with the provinces set the stage for CFEE hosting a meeting of the Curriculum Directors from across

Canada. "There was a shared desire among the provinces to have a learning framework for financial education – along with teaching resources aligned with the framework," said Gary Rabbior, President of CFEE, of the meeting. "This is exactly what the Building Futures program provides, and the work completed to date in Manitoba and Ontario will form the basis of this shared national learning framework to guide financial education in Canada." ■





Our commitment to the Principles for Responsible Investment

Investors Group (and its sister company Mackenzie Investments) continued to demonstrate its commitment to responsible investing in 2015 as a signatory to the [Principles for Responsible Investment](#) (PRI).

The United Nations-supported PRI is a collaborative effort of global investors representing US \$59 trillion in assets under management with the goal of developing a more sustainable global financial system.

It is a set of six aspirational principles that offer a framework for integrating environmental, social and governance (ESG) factors into the investment analysis and decision-making process for mainstream investment managers.

“Considering environmental, social and governance factors in our investment process is not new to us. It was a natural step as one of Canada’s largest mutual fund managers to formalize our commitment to responsible investing and the PRI across all of our investment funds,” said Jeff Singer, I.G. Investment Management’s Chief Investment Officer.

Investors Group formalized its commitment knowing that companies who practice good ESG management are those that demonstrate strong performance over the long term. ■

Supporting local women inspires volunteer

Carole Lessard jokes that she spends her volunteer time working in “the dungeon.”

The dungeon is the crowded storage space of the [Timmins & Area Women in Crisis](#), a women’s shelter offering temporary housing and support for women who are leaving abusive situations. In addition to its 24-hour crisis line, the non-profit shelter offers in-person counselling, advocacy and support for family court appearances. It also helps women and their children secure permanent housing and provides them with basic household goods and clothing to help them move out of the shelter.

“A lot of people drop off donations and they need people to sort out these things,” said Carole. And although she sometimes has to squeeze around the boxes and bags filled with donations, she enjoys opening each container to see what’s inside.

Carole, who has worked as an administrative assistant in the Ontario Northeast region office for 17 years, began volunteering four hours a week at the shelter in 2013 after learning about it through a friend. She said she’s worked at various fundraising efforts through the years, but finds the time she spends at the shelter to be particularly rewarding.

She was delighted to be awarded a \$1,150 grant for the shelter through the Investors Group Volunteer Support Program. Investors Group provides hundreds of grants each year to registered Canadian charities for which Consultants, employees, retirees and/or their immediate families are active volunteers.

Carole said the grant will be used to improve the lighting in the shelter’s parking lot, help to buy playground equipment and provide more for women moving out of the shelter.

She feels the Timmins shelter is providing a vital service. “A lot of women live in fear. So it feels good to help. I know the shelter staff are very appreciative of the work that I do.” ■

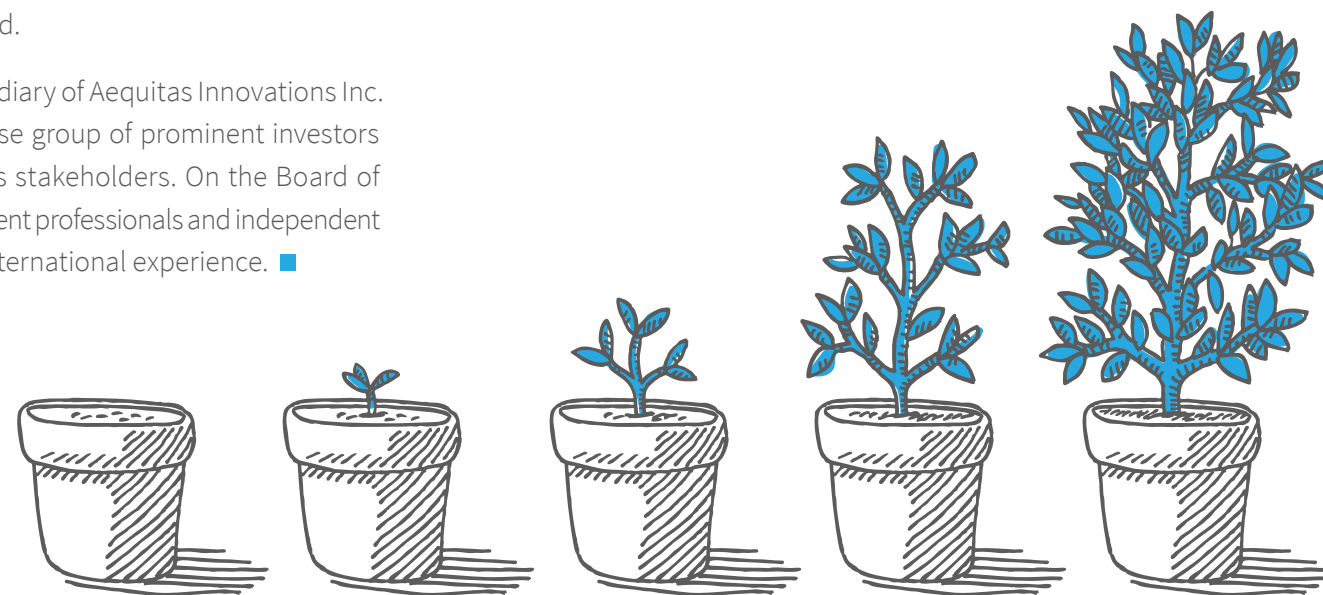

Bullfrogpowering our Winnipeg head office

In 2015 Investors Group made a significant commitment to renewable energy through its choice of 100% green natural gas for its head office building in Winnipeg.



Through an agreement with **Bullfrog Power**, a Canadian green energy retailer, Investors Group buys green natural gas to match the usage for our Winnipeg head office building. Bullfrog Power's green natural gas comes from a unique methane-capture project situated on a Canadian landfill. At the site, biogas is captured, cleaned up, and injected into the national natural gas pipeline to match the amount of conventional natural gas the 19-storey building would normally use. This displaces fossil fuel-based gas and reduces carbon dioxide (CO₂) emissions into the atmosphere.

"Investors Group has a strong corporate culture of caring and that's why we are reducing the impact of our Winnipeg head office on the environment with Bullfrog Power," said Murray Taylor, President and Chief Executive Officer,

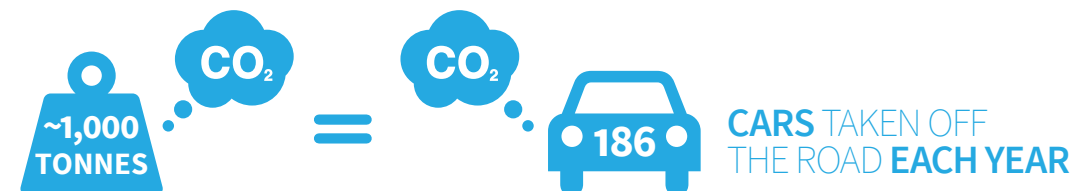
Investors Group. "Supporting green energy is one way we are committing to corporate citizenship and giving back to our communities."

This initiative reduces Investors Group's CO₂ emissions footprint by nearly 1,000 tonnes annually – the equivalent of taking 186 cars off the road each year.

Our commitment to green energy supports the efforts of our parent company, IGM Financial Inc., to responsibly manage its environmental impacts.

Bullfrog Power offers renewable energy solutions that enable individuals and businesses to reduce their environmental impact, support the development of green energy projects in Canada and help create a cleaner world. ■

"It's wonderful to set this example for my children and to carry on the volunteer spirit that my father, mother and father-in-law demonstrated to me." ■

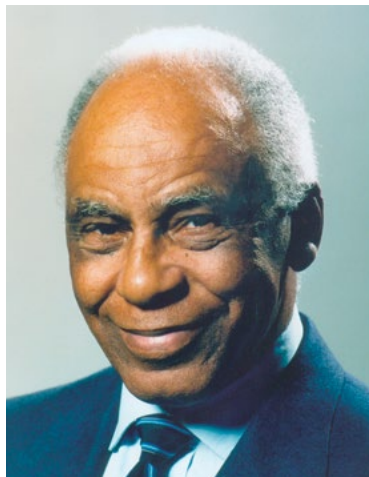

When it comes to volunteering, few people have the determination, eagerness and innate desire of Kathleen Seymour, Client Service Administrator II for Investors Group's Richmond region office.

In recognition of her commitment to improving the lives of those around her, Kathleen was awarded the company's President's Lifetime Volunteer Achievement Award in 2015.

Kathleen has devoted her time to a wide variety of charitable organizations. Her curiosity, passion and ability to conquer her fears have helped her to venture outside her comfort zone in her volunteer pursuits.

"I try to expose myself to things when I volunteer that I might otherwise never come across. It helps me grow as a human being," she explained.

Over the last few years, Kathleen has become a strong presence at Richmond Hospice Foundation. The organization provides emotional and social support for patients and family members coping with a life-threatening or life-limiting illness.

*"More than anything **I am there to listen** – listen to the families, to the patients," she said. **"Everyone has a story to tell and everyone wants to be remembered. I've met some truly exceptional people."***

Last year at a Ride to Conquer Cancer event, Kathleen witnessed a woman bike from Vancouver to Seattle just two days after receiving her last round of chemotherapy. "It puts your entire life into perspective. When you constantly see people who are so determined to live, you can't help but feel inspired."

Greater Vancouver Central Regional Director Bala Naidoo said it was an easy decision to nominate Kathleen for this award. He calls her an unsung heroine whose enthusiasm is as contagious as it is inspiring.

Kathleen was presented with the award during the President’s Volunteer Celebration Reception held in Winnipeg on April 15, 2015. The award came as a shock – she didn’t anticipate winning and initially thought President and Chief Executive Officer Murray Taylor was talking about someone else when he began telling her story. When the time came for her acceptance speech, she was speechless and doesn’t remember a single word she said.

“It all happened so fast. There are so many people to thank. So many people who have helped me become who I am,” said Kathleen.

Along with her award, Kathleen received \$10,000 to donate to the charity of her choice. She has divided \$9,000 between two foundations: the **Richmond Community Hospice Foundation** and the **B.C. Cancer Foundation**. For the remaining \$1,000, Kathleen sat down with her co-workers and asked them where they would like to see it donated.

“They gave me plenty of suggestions. There’s no shortage of worthy causes.” In the end, the remaining \$1,000 was donated to the Richmond Animal Protection Society.

Kathleen is also trying her best to improve the lives of others each and every day with random acts of kindness.

“I pass by the same woman every day on my walk to work and for the longest time she looked absolutely miserable. So I told myself I would smile at her and wish her a good day every time I walked by. Five months later, she’s not only smiling back at me, but at everyone else as well. I like to think I’m part of the reason she’s smiling. We really can make a big difference in our little part of the world.” ■

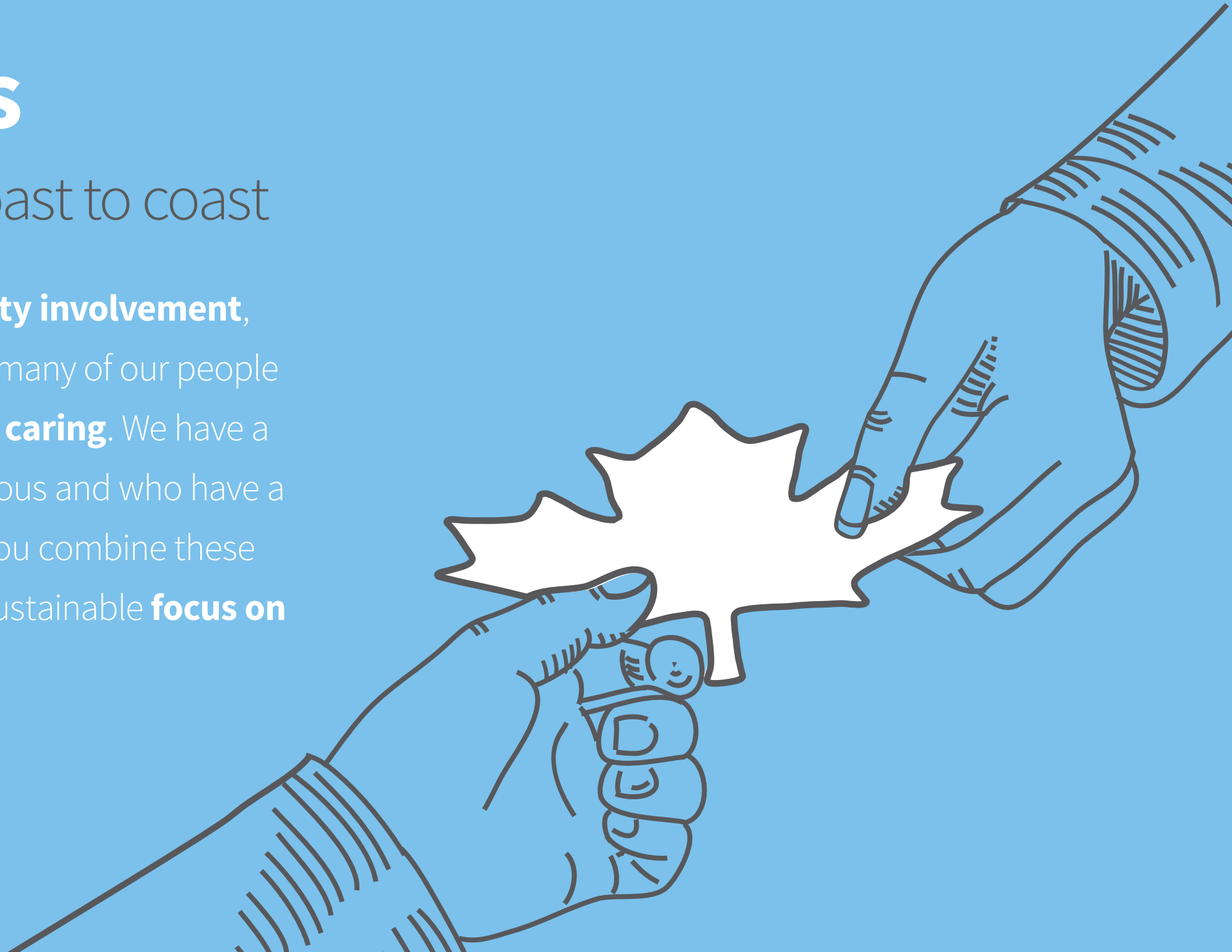

It took 10 pairs of hands, eight hours and more than a few blisters, but at the end of the day, the structure was complete and ready for a group of young artists – guided by 4Cats Studio – to turn it into a masterpiece.

"The mural was finished in July, just in time to welcome 3,000 Scouts at the Pacific Jamboree," said Darlene. "It feels great to have had a little part in making that happen." ■

Saskatchewan Northwest helps rebuild the heart of a town

It was nearly three years ago that tragedy struck the town of LeRoy, Saskatchewan. On a clear May evening in 2013, a faulty wire ignited a fire that claimed the town's community rink. The insurance payment was \$2.2 million. Estimated cost of the new rink: \$5.5 million.

In the months after the fire, the town's 425 residents were faced with a choice: dwell on their misfortune and say farewell forever to the heart of their community or band together and raise the funds to rebuild their rink.

With a hockey team called "The Braves," they knew which option they would pursue. Saskatchewan Northwest Consultant Trenton Moore grew up in LeRoy. His parents still live on the family farm and his younger brother recently moved back to take it over. With his mom stepping up to chair the "Raise the Roof" Rink Rebuild Committee, Trenton wanted to help with fundraising efforts as much as he could.

"I'm currently the captain of the LeRoy Braves senior hockey team and we've been playing games out of Watson, Saskatchewan, since the fire," explained Trenton. "I wanted to contribute to my community so I asked my region office to get involved with the fundraising for the new rink." They jumped at the idea.

"We donated all the proceeds from our annual golf tournament to the Rink Rebuild Project," said Trenton. "With Consultants, Planning Specialists and volunteers taking part, the event hosted 72 golfers and raised around \$3,500."

The region office also donated a major Saskatchewan Roughriders prize package to LeRoy's annual "Play on" 4-on-4 Outdoor Hockey Tournament that brought in over \$8,500.

By the fall of 2015, the town had raised about 90% of the funds for the new facility, and the project got the green light. A sod-turning in September – marking the official start of construction – symbolized a remarkable victory for the home of the Braves. ■





Warm meals, warm clothing

Alberta region offices bring warmth to Mustard Seed shelters

If you had entered Investors Group's Calgary Centre region office in December 2015, you would have noticed the unique decorations on the holiday tree. Instead of lights and tinsel, the tree was adorned with socks, mitts and toques and they all were about to find new homes.

The change in décor came about after the region office had read about the huge need for warm clothing at shelters. of Forces Avenir winners share the details of their project with the golfers. Everyone is blown away by the passion of the students and amazed by the incredible work they do.”

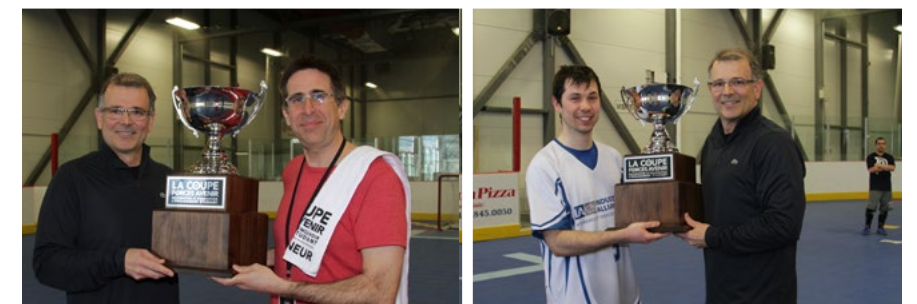
The day concludes with a dinner and a silent auction. In their three years of hosting the tournament, the Québec team has raised a whopping \$99,000.

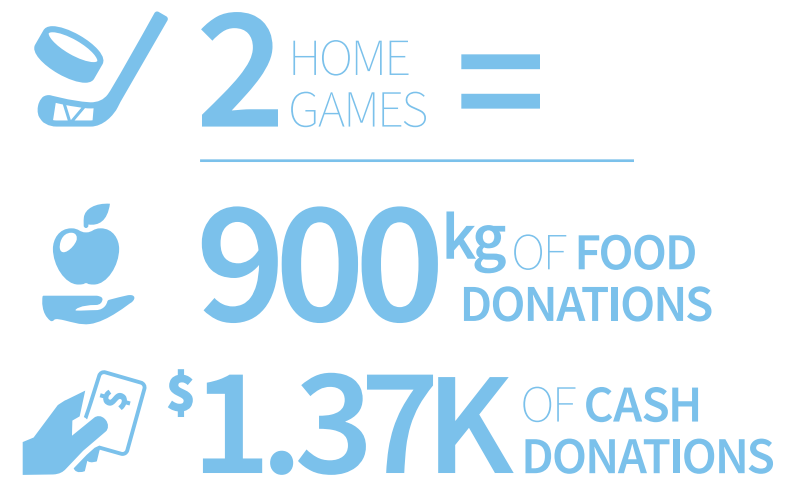

Sixty per cent of all liver transplants in Canada take place at the Hospital for Sick Children ([SickKids](#)). The long-term survival rate of children receiving transplants is thankfully now the rule, not the exception.

A group of committed individuals in the Barrie York-Simcoe office have made fundraising for SickKids a priority. Through an annual golf tournament, they raise funds for Ashley's Angels – a group formed by Sherrie Logan, whose daughter received a life-saving liver transplant in 2009 at the tender age of two. Ashley's Angels has two main goals: to raise funds in support of research, education, and innovation to enhance the quality and quantity of life years restored by organ and tissue transplants; and to raise awareness for organ and tissue donation.

Ashley is the niece of Division Director Marcelo Millar, who is part of the Investors Group team that has hosted the charity tournament for the last five years.

The 2015 tournament – which sold out – took place on a beautiful sunny day at the Barrie Country Club. The group worked hard to garner corporate sponsorships and gather enticing prizes for both live and silent auctions. By the time everyone left the clubhouse, more than \$12,000 had been raised, bringing their five-year total to nearly \$75,000.

Young Ashley was on hand, as she is every year, after her school day was done, to thank the golfers and sponsors and help give out prizes.

“Having seen the emotional turmoil and pain that a family experiences watching their daughter's health deteriorate changes your perspective on life,” said Marcelo. “Giving back to help those who are experiencing these things becomes a priority. And in this situation specifically, it is a very tangible way to help not only my niece, Ashley, but also other children and families that are going through the same thing.” ■

Packaging more than 215,000 meals worldwide to help end hunger

In 2015, our biggest conferences of the year included the chance for attendees to rally together and make a difference for people who need our help worldwide.

Through Investors Group's partnership with **Stop Hunger Now**, an international hunger-relief organization, conference attendees were given the opportunity to participate in food packaging events. Every food package assembled feeds six people and is distributed through food programs in developing countries.

Since it began in 1998, Stop Hunger Now has provided over 239 million meals in 73 countries. In 2015 alone, approximately 600 Investors Group employees, Consultants and Field Directors from across the country packaged 215,784 meals at four different events for those in need in six different countries.

From Nashville...

Our 2015 contribution to Stop Hunger Now began in Nashville, Tennessee, at our Star Performers conference, where our top Securities, Insurance and Mortgage Planning Specialists gathered. Together, 70 participants assembled more than 20,000 meal packets – that's 93 full boxes – that were distributed to a non-profit organization that provides education programs for children in Belize.

For Olga Kokilev, Insurance Planning Specialist from Greater Vancouver West, it was the highlight of the conference. "I really enjoyed the teamwork at this event," she said. "The idea of feeding someone across the globe who doesn't have food really added to the point."





To Sweden...

In June 2015, our President's Club, Round Table Elite and Round Table conference took place in Stockholm, Sweden, to recognize the 2014 performance of the top tier members of our Consultant network and Field Director team. At the hotel, 200 attendees took part in a high-energy event to help people in Malawi. They assembled 65,000 meal packages that were shipped by Stop Hunger Now.

"We had a blast and we packaged a lot of food. It felt good to give back in a way that was so much fun," said Saint John Regional Director Peter O'Neill.

Back to Canada...

In September 2015 the true spirit of camaraderie was experienced yet again at our Apex Summit, the annual gathering of more than 1,500 Investors Group Consultants. The food packaging event was held in Vancouver on the first day of the conference, and was extra special as it marked the first time that Investors Group clients were invited to participate in the event alongside us.

At the event, 200 volunteers put together nearly 69,000 meal packages, a significant contribution to our yearly effort to help those in need.

Beyond the conferences

Recognizing that there are members of Investors Group's head office and region offices beyond our conferences who would also like to lend a hand to this worthy cause, Investors Group hosted a food packaging event in Winnipeg in May 2015.

Over 130 volunteers, including employees from our head office and Consultants and Field Directors from our Winnipeg region offices, packaged more than 61,000 meals in just under two hours. Volunteers surprised Stop Hunger Now event organizers by completing a whopping 475 packages per volunteer.

We are proud of our accomplishments so far through our partnership with Stop Hunger Now and look forward to continuing our pledge to make a difference in the world. ■

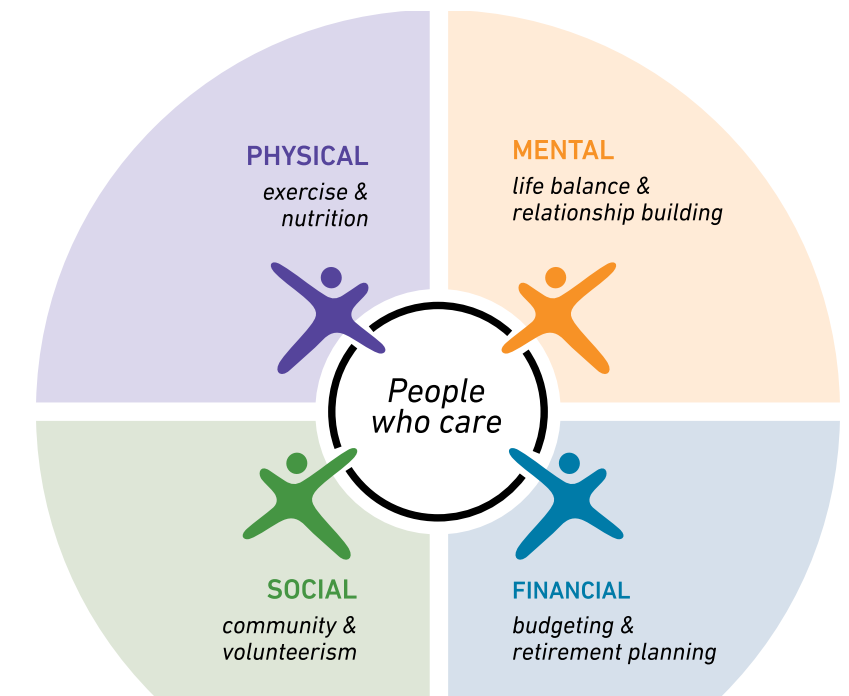

The goal is to help kids believe in themselves, to focus on their strengths and talents, and to encourage them to find adults with whom they can share and confide.

The Investors Group field trippers enjoyed a brown bag lunch at La Maison, provided by another Centraide-supported agency – **Resto Plateau**, a non-profit organization that provides culinary arts training for people struggling to find employment, and through them, operates a popular restaurant that allows low-income people to purchase nutritious meals.

"It was very rewarding to visit La Maison des enfants and see the good work that is supported by community contributions to Centraide," said Nathalie Godbout, Assistant Vice-President, Product Utilization and Planning, who has chaired the QGO Centraide committee for the past six years.

The 2015 QGO campaign was a tremendous success, surpassing the 2014 dollar total and raising more than \$30,000 – the combined total of the two-week campaign and other fundraising activities throughout the year. ■

In the months following their launch, the committee spearheaded the building’s participation in the Winnipeg Earth Day clean-up (April) and Commuter Challenge (June) and a Business Recycling Centre located on the 3rd floor.

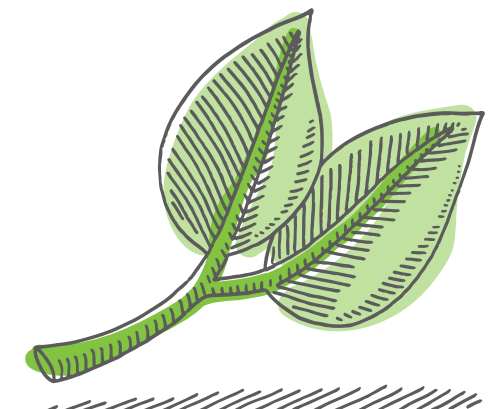
These events are part of the committee’s goal of promoting initiatives in four key areas: waste management and recycling, paper reduction, travel and commuting, and energy conservation.

Helping community projects become reality

Every year the Community Projects Fund (CPF) seeks opportunities to invest in local, community-based initiatives. The Fund – managed by a committee of Investors Group employees – funds organizations based on priorities identified as important by employees. Here are three organizations that will make good use of the funding they received in 2015.



Newcomers Employment and Education Development Services Inc. (N.E.E.D.S.) was established in 1999 by immigrant and refugee women for newcomers to Canada. Their “community outing program” takes groups of newcomer children to community activities. Program

participants are very young and often speak little English, so if separated from the group they may have trouble communicating that they are lost. N.E.E.D.S. will use their \$2,556 grant to purchase “pinnies” and clothing to identify both children and adult leaders so they can more easily be spotted if anyone gets separated from the group in public.



Oak Table is a community organization providing a welcoming place for members of the River and Osborne community in Winnipeg. In addition to serving over 20,000 meals each year, Oak Table provides many services that community members rely on, such as free

haircuts, health clinics, access to computers, resumé writing assistance and help finding community resources. A grant of \$10,000 will help them replace outdated kitchen appliances to allow them to better service their community.



During the school year, **CanU** offers an after-school mentoring program that introduces under-resourced Winnipeg youth to the dream of a post-secondary education. Thanks to an \$8,000 grant, CanU hosted a Summer Internship Program to show youth what

kind of career they can have with a post-secondary education. The program also included a community service element that allowed the interns to learn what it means to give back and to serve others. ■

Investors Group marks anniversary with special donation



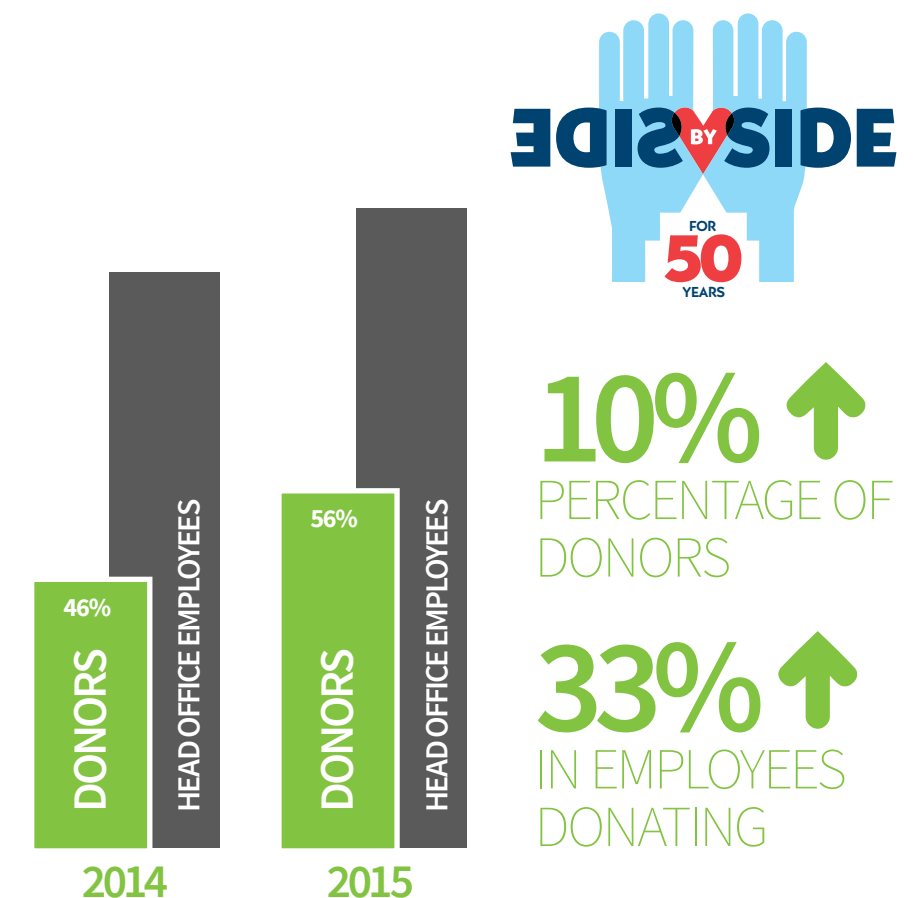

Recognizing that the company has worked closely with United Way Winnipeg for half a century – supporting agencies and programs that make a difference for Winnipeggers – we made “Side by side for 50 years” our campaign theme for 2015.

The creative efforts of employee volunteers made the 50th anniversary campaign special. The usual one-week campaign was made double the fun by adding a second week. A Team Donation Challenge, headed up by a trio of spirited Executive team captains, saw employees divided into three teams and competing to see which squad could get the most team members to donate. The results were remarkable. Habitat for Humanity is a worldwide non-profit organization that brings together volunteers and community partners to provide affordable housing and promote homeownership as a way to break the cycle of poverty for families.

Investors Group's Toronto Downtown region office is a long-time Habitat supporter – donning tool belts and hard hats to help Habitat GTA build nine homes over the last 14 years. Three years ago the Toronto General Office joined the fun, and in September 2015 the Investors Group team completed a home they had begun the year before in the east end of the City of Brampton.

“The first year we were pouring the concrete for the housing complex,” explained Ophelia Ramdath, who is Assistant to Vas Pachapurkar, Vice-President, Financial Services. “The next year we were tidying up the house inside and preparing it for the family to move in. This experience, starting a home for a family and then finishing it a year later, was phenomenal. It was an amazing feeling to know we were the first team there and the last team there to hand off the home to the new family.”

During their time at the building sites, the volunteers were trained in safety procedures and learned how to correctly use screwdrivers, drills, hammers and saws. After 14 years they’ve just about done it all – carrying wood, installing stairs, building walls, laying flooring and painting.

“After our first build in 2001, there was an extraordinary energy in the office the following day. Everyone was sharing their newly discovered construction talents, and comparing sore body parts,” said Sue Neal, Regional Director of Toronto Downtown. “This post-build buzz sealed the deal on making these builds an annual tradition. It is always an excellent team-building experience, as well as an incredibly meaningful way to give back to the communities we serve.” ■





Keeping the wheels of research turning

Our Québec General Office (QGO), Montréal-area Consultants and regional employees have proven for the fourth consecutive year they are willing to go the distance – albeit stationary – for type 1 diabetes research.

Together, they formed teams of five and participated in a heart-pumping stationary bike ride called the **JDRF Ride for Diabetes Research**. This one-day bike-a-thon takes place in more than 20 communities across Canada, with our 2015 participants spinning in Montréal's event at Place Bonaventure.

We had 12 teams for a total of 60 riders, who were all eager to participate in this fun, energetic event.

“Every year we have some people from Investors Group who are participating for the first time and the feedback is always great,” explained Johanne Blanchard, Assistant Vice-President and Legal Counsel, who organizes Investors Group’s participation in the JDRF Ride for Diabetes Research. “They are so pleased to have participated because the event is a lot of fun plus they are giving to a good cause.”

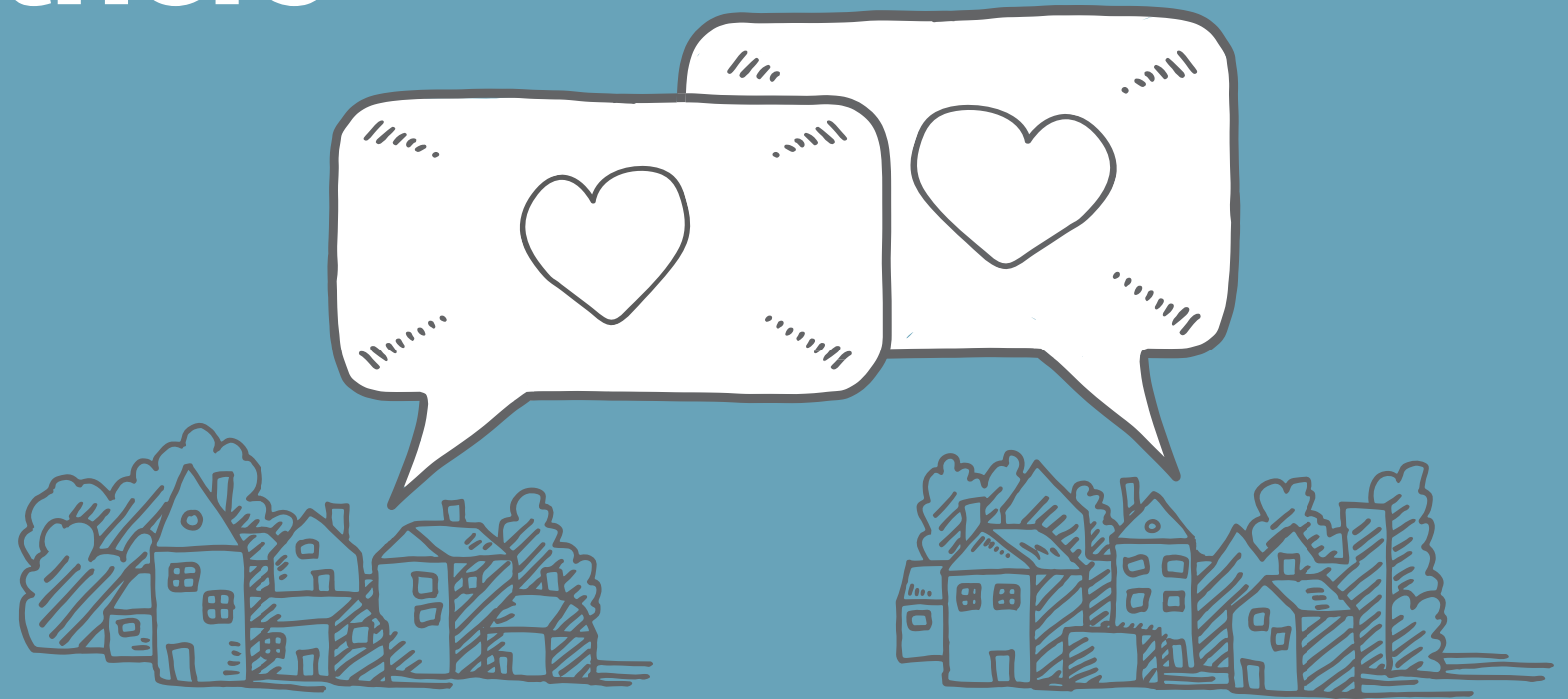

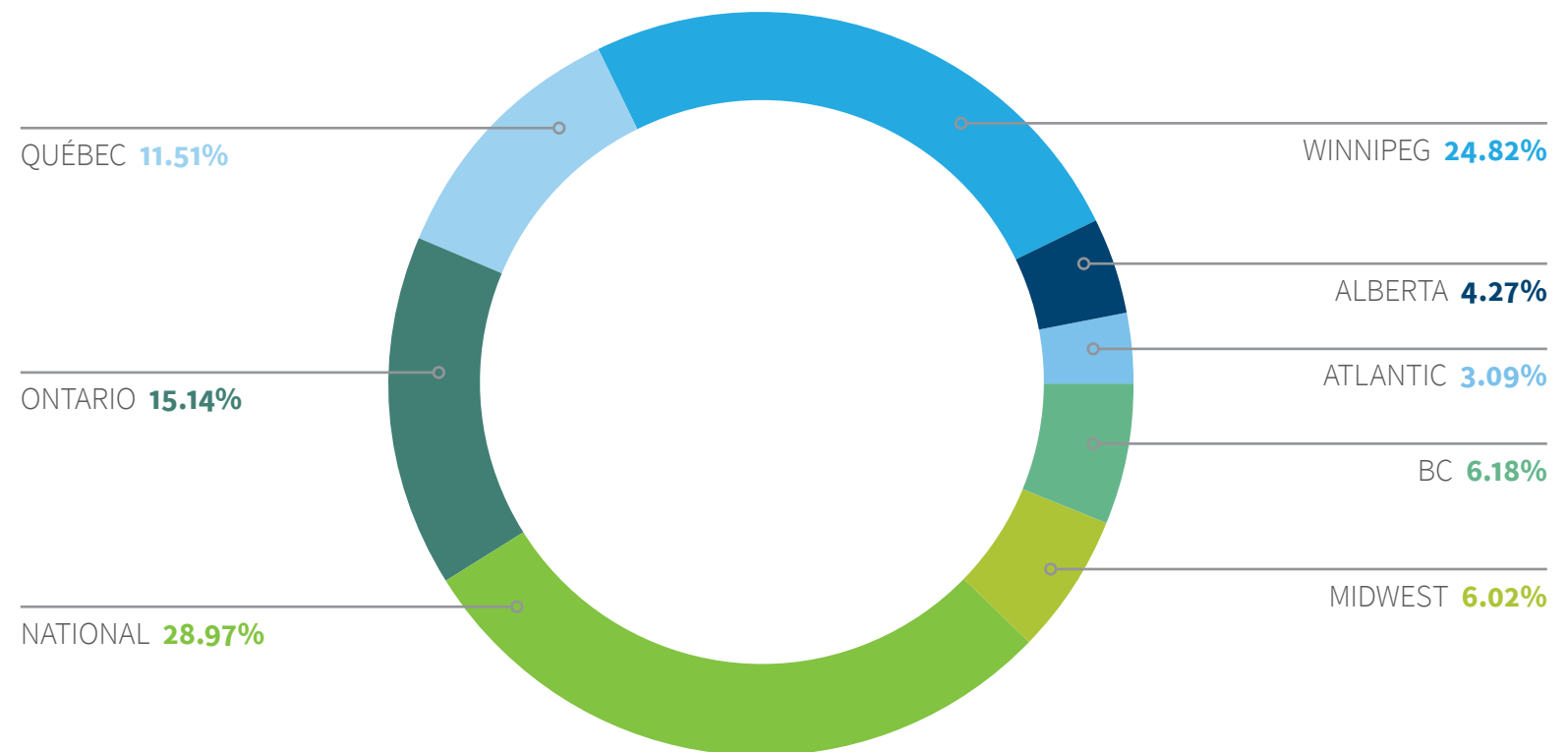




Community funding - percentage by area

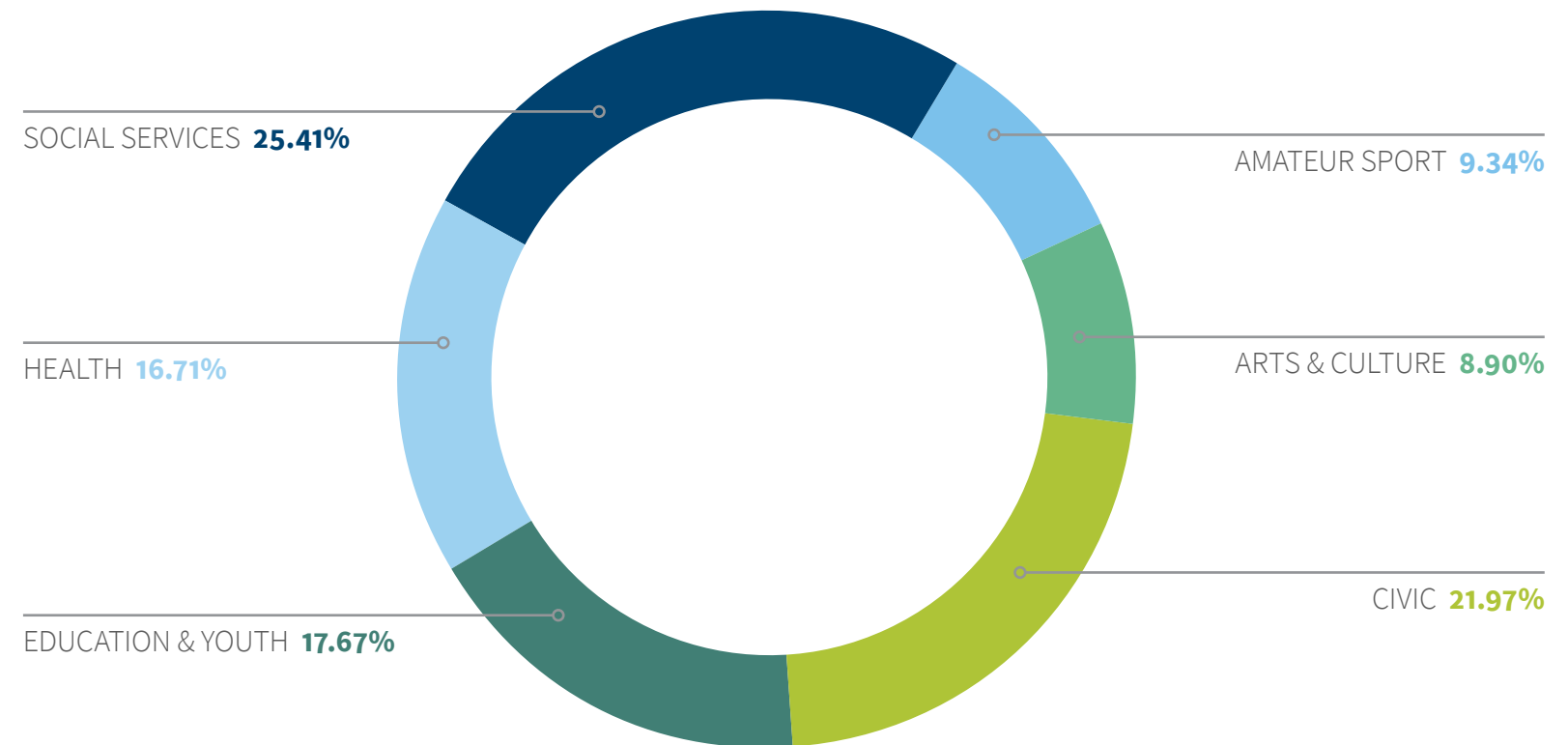




Community funding - percentage by program
